



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COVID-19

Over the last 12 months, the fabric of society has changed momentously with the spread of COVID-19. The University of Leicester's staff, students, alumni and research community have pivoted to support the NHS, the wider community and to advance our understanding of COVID-19.

Being at the forefront of cutting-edge research is part of the University of Leicester's commitment to being 'Citizens of Change'. Philanthropic support from alumni and friends enables the advancement of pioneering and impactful research by scores of dedicated research and academic staff at the University, who are working tirelessly to contribute to the global fight against COVID-19.



Professor Mike Barer, Professor of Clinical Microbiology in our Department of Respiratory Sciences, is conducting world-leading research to trial a new approach to curb the spread of COVID-19. His method uses a mask sampling approach to detect the virus in a person's breath, which is easy to carry out and safe for the person taking the sample. Professor Barer's crowdfunding campaign successfully enabled him to further extend his work in this critical area, helping him to secure more external funding and bring additional experienced scientific colleagues into the team, which will accelerate research to stop the spread of the virus. The support was really appreciated by the team during the very challenging days of early lockdown.

"Coronavirus is spread from the mouth, throat and respiration system of infected individuals. This new approach is exciting because it could help us determine whether a person is infectious or not, even before symptoms of the virus have appeared." said Professor Barer.

PROFESSOR MIKE BARER CLINICAL MICROBIOLOGY

An expert working group led by Professor Kamlesh Khunti, Professor of Primary Care, Diabetes & Vascular Medicine in the Diabetes Research Centre, has developed a novel Risk Reduction Framework for NHS Staff at risk of COVID-19 infection, including those who are male, pregnant, older with long term health conditions, or from a BAME background.

Professor Khunti said: "There is an urgent need for a greater level of understanding as to why workers, and indeed patients, including those from a BAME background, appear to have a disproportionately increased morbidity and mortality from COVID-19 infection."

Professors Barer and Khunti are just two examples of the many Leicester researchers who are applying their expertise to combat the devastating impact of COVID-19 across the world. As 'Citizens of Change', the University of Leicester is committed to delivering transformative research and learning. We are incredibly grateful to all our supporters who make these projects possible and we hope you will enjoy reading about the impact of donations over the past 12 months.

"The Centenary Scholarship has helped both financially and with my confidence, I now feel as though I am accepted as an academic." – Lucy Sarroukh



### Space Park Leicester


Space Park Leicester is a landmark initiative being developed by the University of Leicester in collaboration with local, national and international partners, including Leicester City Council and the Leicester and Leicestershire Enterprise Partnership. It will create a world leading hub for innovative research, enterprise and education in space and Earth observation, providing state-of-the-art facilities and a collaborative community to drive development and growth across all three areas.

Opening spring 2021, Space Park Leicester will provide organisations with unrivalled access to academia, pioneering research, development

knowledge and funding to support business growth and excellence.

With its combination of laboratories, clean rooms, workshops, offices, a creative design studio, a virtual reality cave and flexible teaching and business space, Space Park Leicester will create new opportunities in a sector that requires long-term commitments and supporting research infrastructure.

By drawing on the expertise of both industry and academia, working together in one location, Space Park Leicester will drive research excellence and accelerate application of that new knowledge. This will support industrial growth in the sector and will also develop the skills needed by the workforce to deliver expansion of the space (and wider) economy. A programme of new research will focus on advanced manufacturing for space, the next generation of digital intelligent systems, and novel Earth observation technologies.

The University of Leicester is excited to witness the new opportunities and developments that will arise from Space Park Leicester in the coming years. Philanthropic giving is already making a difference to the development of this important initiative. The Wolfson Foundation has awarded a £500,000 grant towards the founding of a new centre at the University of Leicester to explore deep space. The Wolfson Foundation funds infrastructure that enables world-leading research. This project will be a key pillar of Space Park Leicester.

Dr Nigel Bannister, Associate Professor in the School of Physics and Astronomy, said: "The Wolfson Deep Space Centre will develop new technologies and methods, and adapt existing ones, to enable smaller, lower cost spacecraft to be used in deep space - to expand our exploration of the solar system, to visit planets more often and in ways not possible before, and provide an opportunity for the UK to become a leader. in a new generation of space exploration mission."

This donation will allow researchers at the University of Leicester to be at the forefront of our exploration of the solar system and to develop solutions to major challenges in space exploration.

Many international students have been unable to return home and have remained at the University since the pandemic began, and many have struggled both financially and emotionally during this time.

"This unbudgeted and unplanned development drained my family financial reserves and mental wellbeing, food and medication shopping became challenging for me," said one international student. Through the generosity of our alumni and community donors around the world, we have been able to provide more students with much needed financial support, and the dedicated Student Welfare team have provided emotional and practical support alongside.
