New Master of Education programme starts October 2018

We are very pleased to announce that our newly validated Master of Education programme will begin in the School of Education, University of Leicester on October 31st 2018, led by Dr Sue Dymoke.

Specially designed to appeal to qualified teachers working across all age phases and in different contexts, the programme provides opportunities for part-time study through face-to-face sessions held in twilight hours (4 per module on Wednesdays 4 – 6.30pm) and on two Saturday mornings per module (9.30 – 1.30pm) and blended learning.

The 30 credit modules on offer will enable practitioners to engage in pedagogically-focused study and research. These topics comprise: reflective practice; effective and inclusive pedagogies (both from Oct 2018); mentoring, coaching and development of effective leadership skills; mental health and wellbeing; Practitioner Research Methods (from Feb 2019). The programme has been developed following consultation with our Partnership schools and PGCE alumni.

Course Fees:

- £4,800 for 120 credits (for applicants who already possess 60 credits from completion of a PGCE in the last 5 years) (£2,400 for each year) with 20% discount for University of Leicester Alumni
- £7,200 for 180 Credits (£2,400 for each year) with 20% discount for University of Leicester Alumni
- £3,600 for 90 Credits (University of Leicester PGCE Alumni from 2019 onwards only)

If you are a Leicester graduate there may be discounts available as shown above. Your school may also be able to subsidise course fees.


Students getting real experience of how to plan “Learning Science outside the Classroom”

As part of their University-based Science module, Primary PGCE students recently planned and made a visit to a local site of their own choosing in Leicester, Leicestershire and Northamptonshire.

This visit became part of a Medium Term Plan of learning, devised by the students, for primary children in a relevant science topic. Groups of the students visited the Abbey pumping station, farms, country parks, the Space Centre and others to explore the opportunities these venues provided.

In order to share their learning with other students, they prepared displays which showcased their chosen site, showed how they could incorporate it into a science topic and explained how they could organise a visit there with a class of school children. We have encouraged them to plan this or another trip with their classes during their final teaching experience placement.

Become a Friend of the School of Education




The Friends of the School of Education is for anyone who shares our interest in furthering the educational prospects of children and young people in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland.


Everybody Counts



Our 'Everybody Counts' Project has provided children aged 4 to 12 with engaging educational materials to help improve their confidence with numbers to 100. The Hundred Square poster features 100 portraits, including local children and some famous faces. Each portrait is also included in a set of 100 playing cards that include the person's name, age, the languages they speak and an interesting fact about themselves. The posters and cards have been provided free to schools across the local area, and volunteers have helped with distributing them.

Huge congratulations to Jess Collett one of our Secondary History PGCE students who has published her first children's book on Amazon. Jess tells us that 'The Girl in the Abbey' is a story of friendship and loneliness, new family and grief.
