Careful which parks yeah

Rough parks do you know what I mean ((laughs)) but I suppose when y/ when I was a lot younger and it wasn't so bad playing out on the street with me friends just make fun but when you get older and a teenager just a bit boring really not a lot to do

yeah

but it's a nice area I like round here
