Monophthongisation: /aɪ/ → [a]	I – [a]	This word only, frequent but not consistent
/aɪ/ → [ɑː]	l'm — [aːm]	Consistent for this word
$/ei/ \rightarrow [i]$	they – [ðɪ]	Frequent but not consistent
Vowel variation: /i/ → [ɪ]	we – [wɪ]	Frequent but not consistent
/ɒ/ → [ʊ]	because – [bɪkʊz]	Occurs once
happY vowel	specifically – [spəsɪfiɪʔliː] family - [fæmliː] holiday – [ɒlɪdɪ]	Inconsistent
T-glottalisation	that – [ðæʔ] don't – [dəʊn²]	Frequent but not consistent; word-finally
K-glottalisation	something – [sʊmθɪŋ²] specifically – [spəsɪfiɪʔliː] talked – [tɔːʔt]	Frequent but not consistent, Word - medially and finally
P-glottalisation	perhaps – [pɹæ?s]	This word only; frequent but not consistent
H-dropping	perhaps – [pɹæʔs] holiday – [ɒlɪdɪ] Harold – [æɹəɫd] Harry's – [æɹiːz]	Consistent; word- medially and finally
<-ng> - [ηk]	something – [sʊmθɪηk]	Occurs once (2nd instance /k/ is glottalised)
<-ng> - [n]	doing – [duːwɪn] looking – [lʊkɪn] saying – [seɪjɪn]	Frequent but not consistent
/t/ → [k]	Etcetera – [ɛksɛtuə]	Occurs once
Elision	perhaps – [pjæp's]	Consistent for this
