## 4. Registration periods:

#### Part-time:

Postgraduate Certificate in the Country House
The minimum registration period for the PG Cert is 8 months
The normal period of registration for the PGCert is up to 2 years
The maximum period of registration for the PGCert is 2 years

Postgraduate Diploma in the Country House

The minimum registration period for the PG Dip is 16 months

The normal period of registration for the PGDip is up to 2 years

The maximum period of registration for the PGDip is 4 years

MA in the Country House

The minimum registration for a part time MA is 2 years, for a full time MA is 1 year.

The normal period of registration for the MA is 2 years

The maximum period of registration for the MA is 4 years

## 5. Typical entry requirements:

A first degree in a relevant subject, including but not limited to History of Art, History, English Literature, Archaeology, Cultural Studies.

## 6. Accreditation of Prior Learning:

Students who have taken relevant modules on the campus-based MA in the Country House programme may be permitted to transfer credits into the Distance Learning MA programme. Students so transferring credits will not be permitted subsequently to take DL modules closely resembling those already taken as part of the campus-based course.

#### 7. Programme aims:

For the Postgraduate Certificate and Postgraduate Diploma the aims are to provide:

- an understanding of the social, cultural and economic history of the Country House from the sixteenth century to the present day;
- a detailed knowledge of some major features associated with the Country House or its architecture and the secondary literature on the subject;

• and an understanding of the complex and changing place of the Country House in its local, regional and national environments.

For the MA in the Country House the aims are as above plus:

• to equip students with the knowledge and skills to design, plan and undertake an independent research project leading to the writing of a dissertation on an aspect of the Country House.

# 10.Special features:

Each module provides course materials in the form of a Study Guide and a Blackboard site. Study guides provide 'tutorials in print', outlines of research questions, guides to further reading and self-assessment exercises. Blackboard is used for additional information (e.g. news of seminars,

public lectures, new publications). Blackboard will also be used for tutor-moderated discussion boards on each week's study topic.

The structure allows students to study on a module-by-module basis and therefore develop from a PG certificate (60 credits) to a PG Diploma (120 credits) to a full MA (180 credits) at their own pace and according to their own learning needs, interests and individual circumstances.

## 11.Indications of programme quality:

The DL programme has been designed to parallel much of the structure and content of the existing campus based programme. It has most of the same learning outcomes as the campus programme. The core module is close to that on the CB programme but the other three do not overlap, but complement, the options on that programme.

It has received positive feedback from the external examiner: 'The distance-learning [MA], with its meticulous handbook, provides a well-supported introduction to many aspects of, and approaches to, country house history, with plenty of opportunity for students to develop their own interests. I like the way students are required to engage with country houses in their area, and that certain themes, e.g. servants, were developed at different points in the module.'

# 15. Additional information [e.g. timetable for admissions]

The full Masters Degree (MA) takes two years of part-time study, but it is possible to study for a shorter Postgraduate Diploma (PGDip) or Postgraduate Certificate (PGCert) instead. All three variants start with the mandatory module on 'The Country House in Art, Literature and History' which can also be taken as a stand-alone short course for interest and/or continuing professional development.

Currently there are no 'optional modules': one takes all four available modules in a prescribed sequence, then the dissertation module. Modules are not split by level. For the PGDip, you take all four modules other than the dissertation module: you do not write a dissertation. For PGCert you take the mandatory first module and one other.
