10. Special features

There are two distinctive features to this programme. One is the structure of the core modules which are designed in such a way as to allow students to follow their own particular interests within a broad framework. The other is the dissertation (in its 60 and 90 credit forms) which places primacy on (supervised) research and independent learning. The MA is seen very much as a research pathway for potential PGR students.

11. Indicators of programme quality

The programme specification has been drawn up in accordance with the QAA Benchmarking Statement for Communication, Media, Film and Cultural Studies (in relation to programme content) and the Qualification Descriptors for Master's Degrees (levels and skills). The benchmarking statement's emphasis on interdisciplinarity and diversity is addressed through the input of staff from different academic subject areas (Film Studies, English and Modern Languages). The programme conforms to the subject knowledge section of the statement in respect of attention to the formal properties of film, aesthetics, the political economy of the film industry, and issues of representation, ideology and identity. The emphasis on readings of key texts will fulfil the requirement to engage with 'major thinkers, debates and intellectual paradigms' that have informed the subject.
