5. Typical entry requirements

Normally an upper second class honours or equivalent degree in English. Those without such qualifications are either required to satisfy the Chair and Director of Postgraduate Study in a qualifying exam (usually an essay) or are required to satisfy the University that previous training and experience provides sufficient qualification. Applicants whose first language is not English must meet the University's requirement in their IELTS (or equivalent) score of 6.5.

- To foster students' independent thinking and judgment, and to further their skills in critical analysis, writing, and bibliography and research methods
- To equip students with relevant presentational skills
- To prepare students for future careers and/or further postgraduate work by enhancing the following transferable skills: accessing, retrieving, organising and presenting information from a variety of sources; thinking clearly and independently; presenting complex ideas and arguments clearly and effectively in both verbal and written forms; writing and presenting to a professional standard; the effective solving of technical and intellectual problems; working with others in gathering, analysing and discussing information; managing and organising time; using up-to-date IT.

11. Indicators of programme quality

A Modern Literature MA has been run by the Department of English for more than twenty-five years. Originally it was MA in Modern English and American Literature, chaired by Philip Dodd (former Chairman of the Institute of Contemporary Arts). It was then revised in the early 1980s as MA in Modern Literature: Theory and Practice to address a perceived lack of training in literary theory and to exploit the market for a master's course concentrating on theory.

Later it became MA in Modern Literature; the emphasis on introducing theory was reduced because teaching in this field is now widespread at undergraduate level. More recently, the addition of a Creative Writing pathway has led to the MA in Modern Literature and Creative Writing, supported by the appointment of Creative Writing tutors. Since the establishment of the MA Creative Writing, the pathway has remained a popular route. This, then, has always been a course sensitive to pedagogic needs, and its survival in such a fierce market of similar degrees is in itself testament to its reputation.

Many of our former students have gone on to become university lecturers, to write books and to take up a wide variety of senior professional careers. The course is now established as a field-leader and after some lean years, thanks to student debt and the paucity of funding, the MA now recruits well and consistently in a fiercely competitive market, attracting a range of UK and international students. The fact that a significant proportion of the students in each year's cohort have chosen to stay on after taking the BA in English is testimony not only to the appeal of the programme but also to students' confidence in the quality of the School's teaching and research culture.

External Examiners have confirmed that the assessment strategy, standard of achievement, design and delivery of the curriculum are effective and of similar standard to other comparable programmes in the sector

In cases where a student has failed to meet a requirement to progress he or she will be required to withdraw from the course and a recommendation will be made to the Board of Examiners for an intermediate/exit award where appropriate.
