All candidates should be able to demonstrate a commitment to, or strong interest in, museums, galleries, or other kinds of heritage or cultural organisation.

If seeking entry without a degree, you will be asked to complete an assessment, such as an essay, so as to demonstrate your readiness for postgraduate study. Clear guidance will be provided on assessment criteria. You may also be required to attend an interview.

All applicants must satisfy the University's English language requirements as detailed in the Senate Regulations.

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As part of studying at a research-intensive university, students on this programme have the following extra or co-curricular opportunities available to them to gain exposure to research culture:

Students are required to undertake a mandatory series of courses on different research methods including ethnographic research, mixed methods research, data analysis, literature reviews, ethics review, as part of our MU7008 Research module. Students will complete an independent study of their choice, carrying 60 credits, under the guidance of an academic staff.

We regularly invite museum professionals and researchers to deliver guest lectures as part of our taught modules.

In addition, students are invited to attend seminars and conferences organised by our academic staff through our research networks, such as 'Institute of Digital Culture', 'Asian Art, Museum and Heritage' and 'Cr/ia [Creative Research / Instituting Art]'. These free-of-charge seminars and conferences are typically held on campus, and students are regularly invited and encouraged to attend.

Teaching on this programme will be research-informed (it draws consciously on systematic inquiry into the teaching and learning process itself) in the following way:

We ensure that all staff remain up to date with current best practices in Museum Studies pedagogy through a combination of ongoing professional development, research-led teaching, and active engagement with the museum and heritage sector. Our teaching is closely informed by staff research and professional practice, ensuring that course content reflects current debates, methodologies, and challenges within Museum Studies.

All academic staff with teaching and marking responsibilities receive regular training and updates related to their teaching practice, including research-inspired education, and through the annual staff away day in September. In addition, staff are actively encouraged to share innovative approaches to research-inspired teaching and to participate in training sessions and events organised by the Leicester's Education Academy, and during the monthly School meetings and School Education Committee meetings.

The School actively supports all staff involved in teaching to obtain an accredited Higher Education teaching qualification, in which they demonstrate their application of pedagogical theory to their own practice and reflect on their teaching as well as ongoing professional development.

In addition, regular programme reviews, peer observation, and curriculum development meetings provide structured opportunities for staff to share best practice and reflect on teaching approaches. Student feedback is also systematically reviewed and used to inform pedagogical development, ensuring our teaching remains responsive, current, and aligned with sector standards.

12. Criteria for award and classification
